

I know you have questions concerning the roles and responsibilities of your executive committee. For the next few months I was thinking of exposing the important role of your executive. Your executive is composed primarily of 4 members – a chair person, the vice-chair, the treasurer and the secretary. I would like to start by discussing the role of the secretary. You could be surprised to find out how important this position is.

The secretary is a member in good standing of the ASQ and the section to which he/she offers his/her services, nominated by a committee, introduced and elected at the annual section assembly.

The secretary's responsibilities are various. The individual manages, maintains and if appropriate

publishes portions of the section documentation - its legal records. The candidate must be ready to invest at least 3 or 4 hours a month over a one-year term that can be renewed

The position offers the opportunity for the candidate to enhance his/her leadership skills, as well as oral and written communications skills. It will also provide the candidate with the opportunity to meet other quality professionals and contribute to the development of the quality movement.

All that to say that a section cannot function to its highest potential without its secretary and it is a position that is very fulfilling and very rewarding to the individual, the organisation and the community.

Quality tools

All professions have a set of tools used by their members to conduct work. For example, accountants use spreadsheets, journals and the chart of accounts; auto mechanics use pliers, socket wrenches and electronic diagnostic equipment; dentists use X-rays, drills and grinders (ouch).

The list of tools for quality professionals is quite large because members tend to adopt and adapt techniques from other fields. Quality professionals also need to be able to apply their skills to a wide variety of organizations, processes and situations. Additionally, they need to be able to apply the tools both at the micro and macro level of an organizational system.

For someone new to the profession, the range of tools might be overwhelming. Upon review, however, you will learn each tool has its own unique purpose; but because similar results can often arise using different tools, you need to be able to take into account situational differences when deciding which tool to apply. ASQ Certifies Calibration Technicians (CCT)

The ASQ has initiated a new certification called a CCT or Certified Calibration Technician. The prime requirement is a minimum of 5 years of documented experience, some which may be waved by an advanced degree.

As the title implies, this certification covers all aspects of the calibration of measuring and test equipment. Certification is by a four-hour exam given each June and December starting in June 2003. The certification is for three years at which time the holder must recertify.

The body of knowledge (BOK) covers the following areas: General Metrology (30 Questions), Measurement Systems (25 Questions), Calibration Systems (25 Questions), Applied Mathematics And Statistics (20 Questions), Quality Systems and Standards (15 Questions) and Uncertainty (10 Questions).

You can apply at any time up to the cut-off date to write this exam. In addition to the above primary source of information, as always, your Certification Chair (Mr. Norman Dickinson, n.dickinson@alumni.concordia.ca) or your Education Chair (Mr. David Tozer, tozerdd@sympatico.ca) may also answer your questions.



The 12th International Conference on Software Quality (ICSQ), Ottawa

I recently spent two crisp autumn days in Ottawa. The event? The twelfth ICSQ held at the Westin in the center of our nation's capital city.

The first day started with a keynote address by Tom DeMarco, that I was eager to attend, having consulted some of Tom's texts such as "Controlling Software Projects" and "Why Does Software Cost So Much?". His topic was Secrets of the Agile Organization and his message was this prescription for a new era:

- ✍ Become less efficient (don't over-optimize your organization).
- ✍ Lighten process (strive for light process and heavy skills).
- ✍ Learn to prioritize.
- ✍ Choose your projects very wisely; what you decide not to build is more important than how you build.
- ✍ Invest in human capital.

The rest of the day was filled with sessions on quality processes, project management, standards, metrics, measurement, networking, agile modeling, customer satisfaction and certification. Between sessions we were tempted by food, food and more food.

Another famous name I can drop is Tom McCabe who was one of the invited speakers and talked to us about Leveraging Our Software Assets: Methodologies, Metrics and Management Tools for the New Frontier – Internet Collaborative Computing.

Dr. Alain Abran, Professor and Director of the Software Engineering Research Laboratory at the École de Technologie Supérieure (ETS) – Université du Québec, gave the keynote address, closing the first day. His topic (also familiar to me because I was one of the SWEBOK reviewers) was the Emerging Consensus on the Software Engineering Body of Knowledge (SWEBOK). Dr. Abran, Co-executive Editor of SWEBOK, gave us a history of the SWEBOK project through its Strawman, Stoneman and Ironman phases, its objectives, audience, and content. He also provided us with insight into the current users and uses of the SWEBOK.

The day was topped off with a reception, perfect for making and renewing acquaintances. As during all the

breaks we were also able to meet the exhibitors which included the Westfall Team, NVP Software Testing, Compuware, Rational, CDI Corporate Education Services, the IEEE Computer Society and the ASQ Ottawa Chapter.

Day two was another whirlwind of activity, starting with a keynote address by John Musa, principal author of the widely-acclaimed pioneering book "Software Reliability: Measurement, Prediction, Application". His topic was Software Reliability Engineering – For a More Efficient Software Process. In his presentation, he showed us where to apply SRE in the software development process and that "SRE gives you a powerful way to engineer software-based products so you can be confident in the availability and reliability of the software-based product you deliver as you deliver it in minimum time with maximum efficiency". By the way, you may one day find a book authored by his cat, so far she has only been acknowledged in the dedication.

Once again we were faced with having to decide which presentations to attend. There were speakers on topics such as SPICE, software metrics, CMM and CMMI and testing techniques.

The most entertaining and informative Tim Lister concluded the day and the conference with the closing keynote address. A frequent collaborator with Tom DeMarco, it seemed fitting that Tim reiterate the message of the importance of Value that Tom had begun. In his presentation on Risk Management and Value Assessment for Product Discrimination, his message was twofold:

✍ "The Strategy is Simple...Build so that when time is up you can say, "At least we built as much of the most important stuff as we could."

✍ A Risk Ritual...Identify risks, Assess risk exposure, Determine which risks to manage, Form action plans for *direct* risks, Form mitigation plans for *indirect* risks, Determine contingency fund, Build tripwires into project plan, Keep the process going..."

And so ended another ICSQ, prizes were awarded, organizers were thanked and everyone said au revoir until the 13th ICSQ to be held in Dallas, October 7-8, 2003.
